Granted, a good academic result is an inseparable key to success, what is far more essential in a

workplace is getting along with others. With so few chances for students to communicate with others, it is impossible for them to develop social skills and common sense. Thus, thanks to the erroneous social atmosphere, it is not possible for students to succeed in the workplace.
